Yay! We found a rental in San Miguel de Allende, Guanajuato, Mexico! We are here from mid-December through mid-March this season. We have been spending two months each winter there nearly every year since 2001. This is our first year to be here for my birthday, Christmas and Valentine's Day!

Step back to November...

Tulsa, OK: Oops! The Philbrook Museum of Art in Tulsa, OK, is closed today. I hope we can see it on our way home.

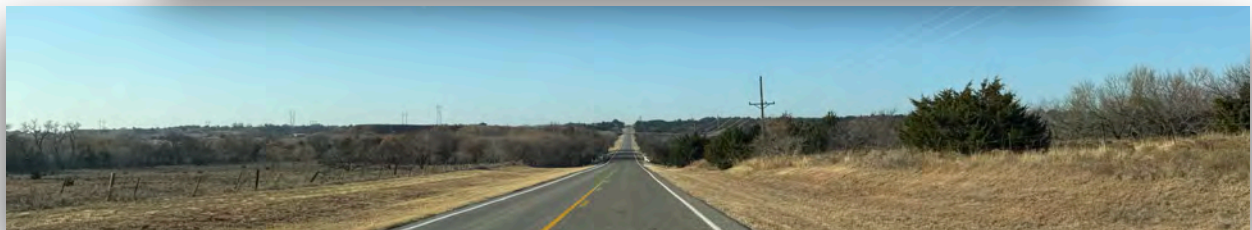

THE BATTLE OF PALO DURO CANYON

As the sun rose on September 28, 1874, Colonel Mackenzie led the US Army into Palo Duro Canyon. They worked their way down the canyon, forcing the Kiowa, Cheyenne, and Comanche to flee and leave their winter supplies behind. Mackenzie's soldiers burned the supplies in a huge bonfire and slaughtered over a thousand horses. Loss of human life was low, but the tribes could not make it through the winter without their supplies.

Palo Duro Canyon State Park, is the second largest canyon in the US! It is 500 feet deep and Beautiful!!!



3:27pm 76 sunny degrees: Happy cows graze along a gravel road. Now we head south on I-27 toward Lubbock, TX.

Dec.18, 8:31am, 50 sunny degrees, Wolforth, TX:
Gas is \$2.05 for regular!

Here in Brownfield, regular gas is \$2.49 a gallon. Pretty amazing difference.

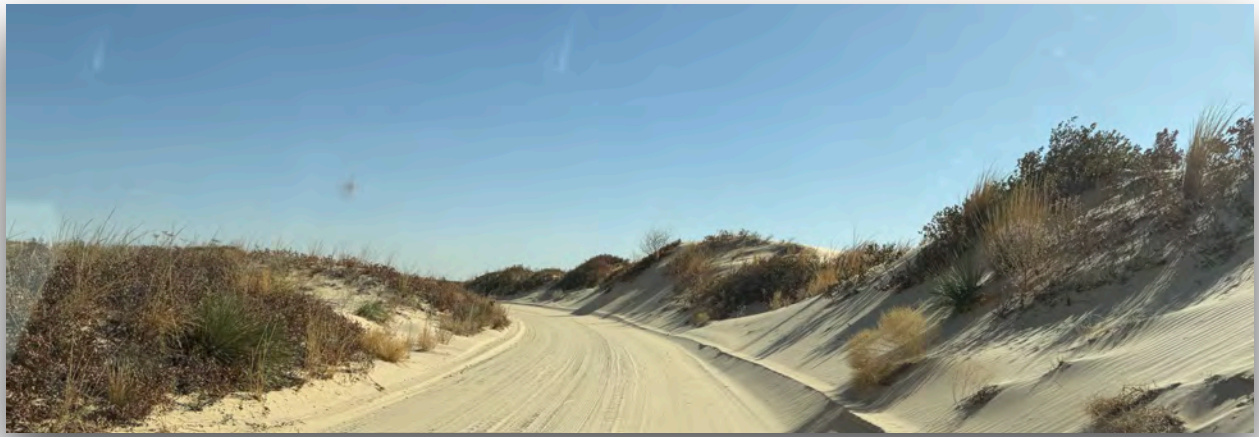


9:32am: We figure an oil baron lives on this estate.



10:05am: We are headed to Wink, TX. Brian and his family lived in Midland TX from 1950-1956. He said he could see a flare of Wink from Midland. Oil wells are galore. This is definitely a different kind of rural than Hoffman, Illinois where my parents were raised.





11:43am, Monahans Sandhills State Park: Brian walks Coltz in the sand hills this very windy day. He says the sand hills over this hill are likely 50 feet high.

12:55pm: We pass a train with around 150 cars. Two locomotives assist in the middle of all cars. Two trucks pass and interrupt my count.



1:35pm: The Davis Mountains nearly surround us. They are a beautiful and welcome change of scenery. The altitude is 5200 feet! It must be why Alpine, Texas is called Alpine. ;-))

1:52pm: We are at 6774 feet! Texas Highway 118 is a hilly, twisty mountain road with beautiful views!



McDonald Observatory - 6774 feet!



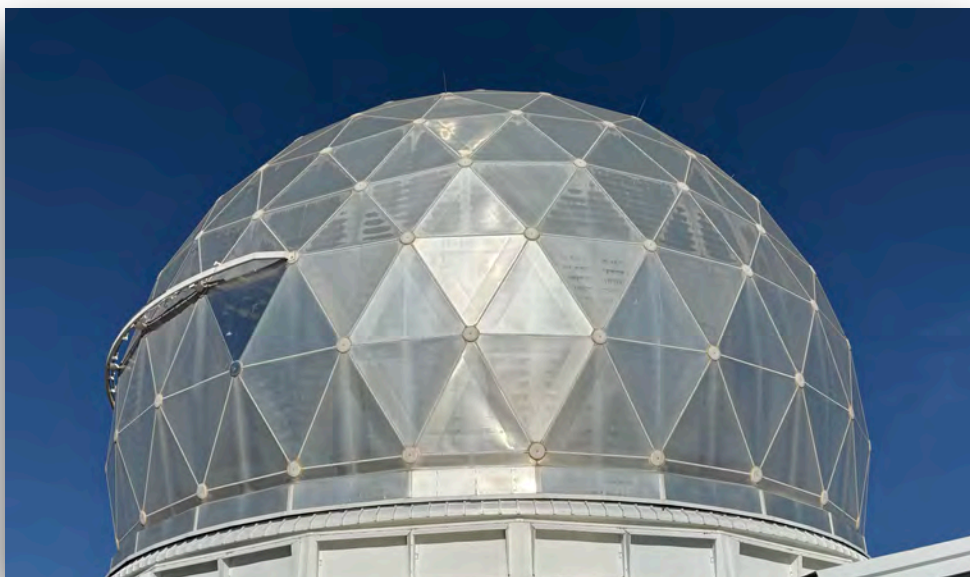
This rotatable telescope weighs 160 tons! Now the whole dome is rotating with a rather eerie sound. This telescope was built in 1968, six years after Brian and I graduated from high school. It is the second largest telescope in the world.





This telescope can be rotated inside the dome.

Brian's parents brought him to this area several times in the early 50s when they lived in Midland, TX.



5:59pm: We settle into our room 212 at the beautiful old Holland Hotel in Alpine, Texas, which is 4497 feet above sea level. Brian walks Coltz around the block. He's been in his crate way too long today.



We walk two blocks for an excellent day-after-my-birthday dinner at the Reata restaurant. This big boy is on the wall in the restaurant. My tuna and broccoli dinner is delicious!

Dec.19, 8:37am, sunny 57 degrees: Alpine, Texas is a neat little town. Beautiful brickwork is in the center of downtown streets where they cross. Great looking little shops are abundant.



Dec. 19, 2025, 9:16am: This gorgeous lobby is in the Gage Hotel in Marathon, Texas. Built in 1927, it is in the National Register of Historic Places.

In Sanderson, Texas, Brian finds an amazing hardware store! I didn't catch the name of it, but, oh my! It has enough inventory along the narrow isles of three floors to keep one occupied for at least a week!

Brian spots a blimp over the highway. Next we see a small fenced field with many, many goats.

Altitude now is 2100 feet.

Neither the online Marriott number nor the number Brian got works. We'll just have to check in when we get to Saltillo.

Many box cars are simply parked on tracks to our left. No engine.

Texas Highway 90 is nice and smooth.

Brian sends population info:

Jeff Davis County, TX - As of the 2020 census, 1,178 people, 896 households, and 632 families were living in the county.

Ft Davis, TX – Population 1024

Valentine, TX – Population 73

McDonald Observatory - 64

Try as I did, I am not sure I made a reservation at the Four Points by Sheraton on Sautillo, Mexico. The phone number we have for the hotel does not work,



1:54pm, 74 degrees: We cross the border at Eagle Pass, TX, to Piedras Negras, Mexico. Brian gets pesos, but where do we get our passports stamped?



3:52pm, 76 degrees: The Mexican landscape is similar to what we saw in west Texas, complete with mountains in the background. There are more cactus, however, and many power lines.

Most roads are good, but when they aren't they are not good!

4:55pm, 76 degrees: 104 miles to Saltillo.

In Mexico, a two lane highway with shoulders is often used as a three lane road with the middle being the passing lane.



Dec. 19, 5:15pm: Beautiful mountains to our left.



Dec. 20, 7:26am, 58 degrees: A gentleman fills our gas and cleans our windshield. It reminds me of my childhood. This dog rests outside the station.

7:50am: Caseta de Cobra, a busy toll station on our way to San Miguel. Charge: \$2.83.

A Beautiful Day...

8:06am, 42 degrees: 7100 feet.

9:05am, 47 degrees: 6100 feet. Brian sees a Bear Crossing sign on this 4 lane highway with a median. There are many bull crossing signs.

9:40am, 53 degrees: We pass a horse grazing in the sunny median.

10:10am: Real clouds! Not just fog. Briefly. Three minutes later, clear skies again. ;-))

Mexico's way to slow traffic is to put rows of tiny metal bumps across the highway. Around ten rows, spaced I'm guessing, maybe 20 feet apart, remind drivers to slow down.

10:36am, 63 sunny degrees: Brian chooses the toll road. This Caseta de Cobra is not very busy.

11:02am: A man tends a flock of grazing goats in the median.



11:30am: Lots of cactus are for sale in many stands along the highway.

12:27pm: One hundred more miles to San Miguel. ;-))

I love this large red maple leaf on the back and the sides of a big white truck. See the profile of a face in the center? I love it and found this image on a website for Gonzales Trucking!

1:12pm: It is 77 degrees here and 55 degrees at home.

We pass huge greenhouses and an outdoor slightly covered cow area with lots of cows. Next we pass white covers suspended by polls. Greens are growing underneath.

Finally, a sign saying San Miguel is just 20 miles. We are on a new four lane road with flowers in the center



2:20pm: Finally, we see a recognizable street and, we get to our rental apartment in Puente Verde, above. Indeed it is a gated community and it is quiet!!!

5:24pm: Whew! After naps we are reasonably unpacked and somewhat organized. I'm so glad Brian brought an extension cord for there are hardly any outlets in this place. Now I need to find my iPhone charger cord and plug for the wall.



Our first night we eat at our first night restaurant, “El Pegaso” Brian and I each order his favorite, Eggs Benedict. Delicious!

The Jardín is packed tonight.



7:11pm: The Christmas Tree and church in the Jardin.

7:37pm: We arrive home from our favorite first night in San Miguel restaurant, El Pegaso. It is a good downhill walk.



Dec. 21, 2025, 10:19am: This is the first street to our right as we walk toward the Jardin. I love the Christmas ribbons and the fact that LaConnexion, our mail service, is so close.



Dec. 22, 2025, 5:45pm: I smile at this sign, and the pizza is delicious at this little place in Fabrica Aurora. It is an easy, long level block to walk there...

Dec. 23, 2025: My 87 year old cousin Janice Boeker Nierman passed at 2:23am at High Point Senior Living Center in Centralia, IL. Her funeral will be Monday, Dec. 29 in Hoyleton, IL. She is in a much better place.
